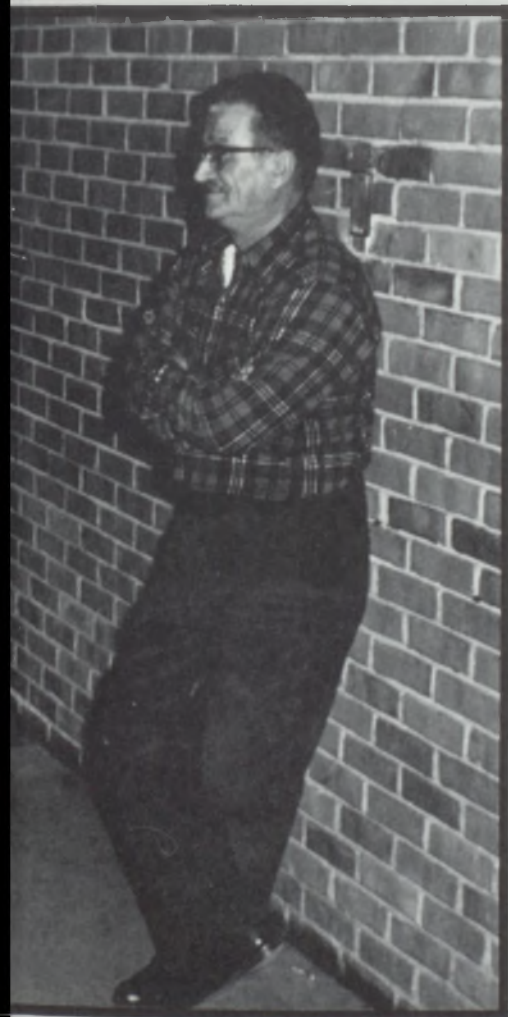
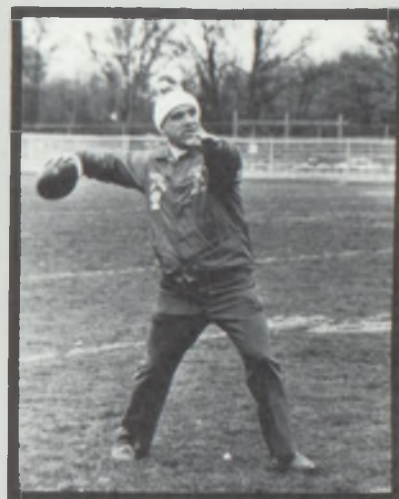


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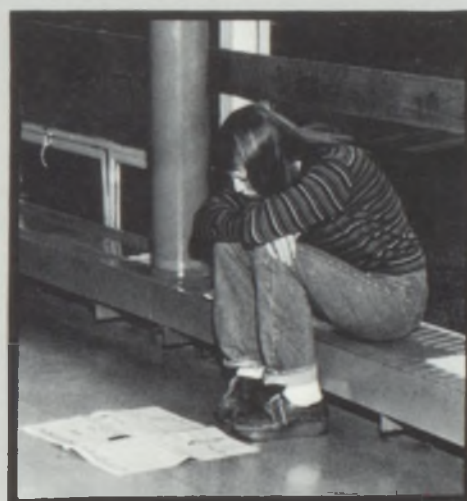
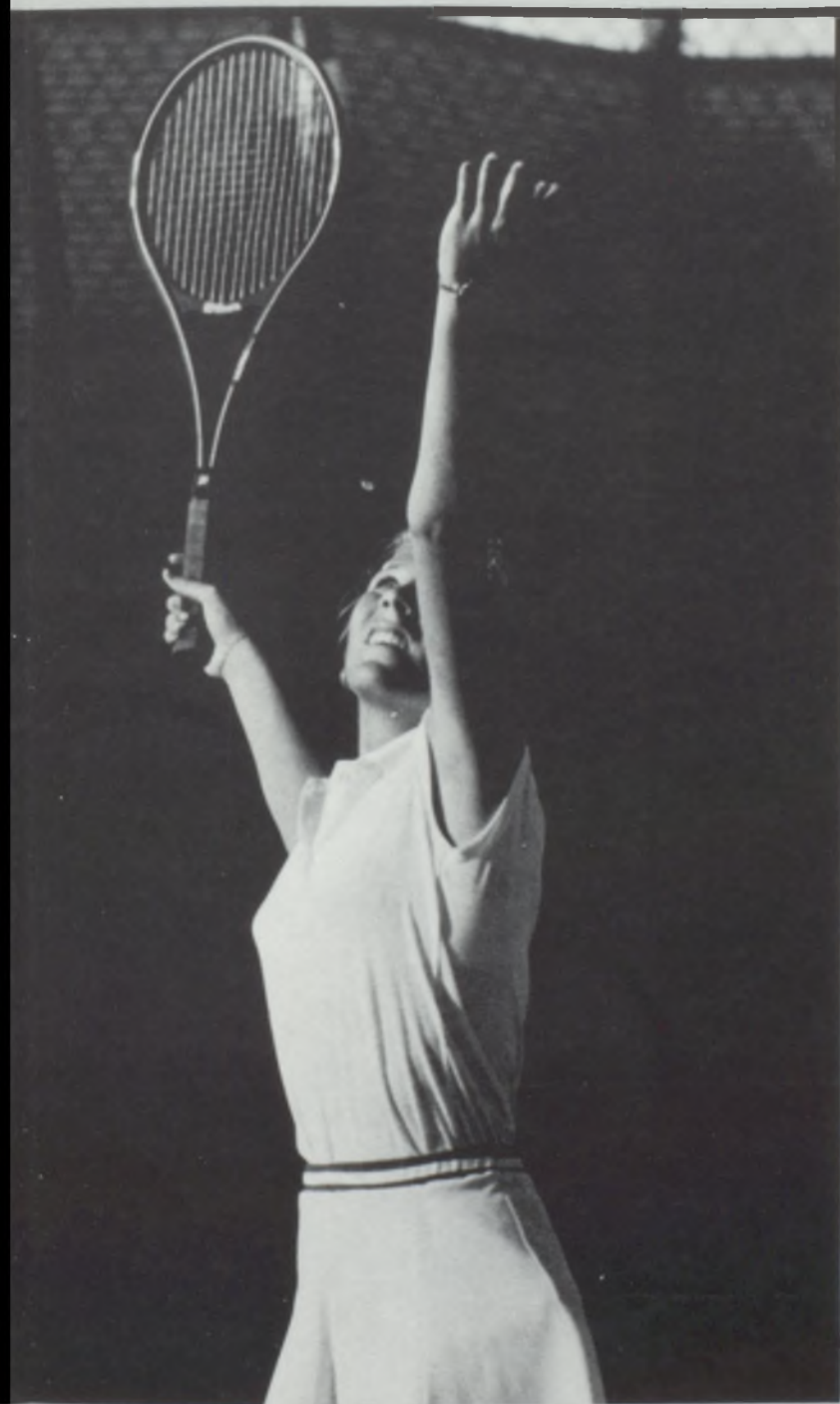
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# Everybody Loves a Winner

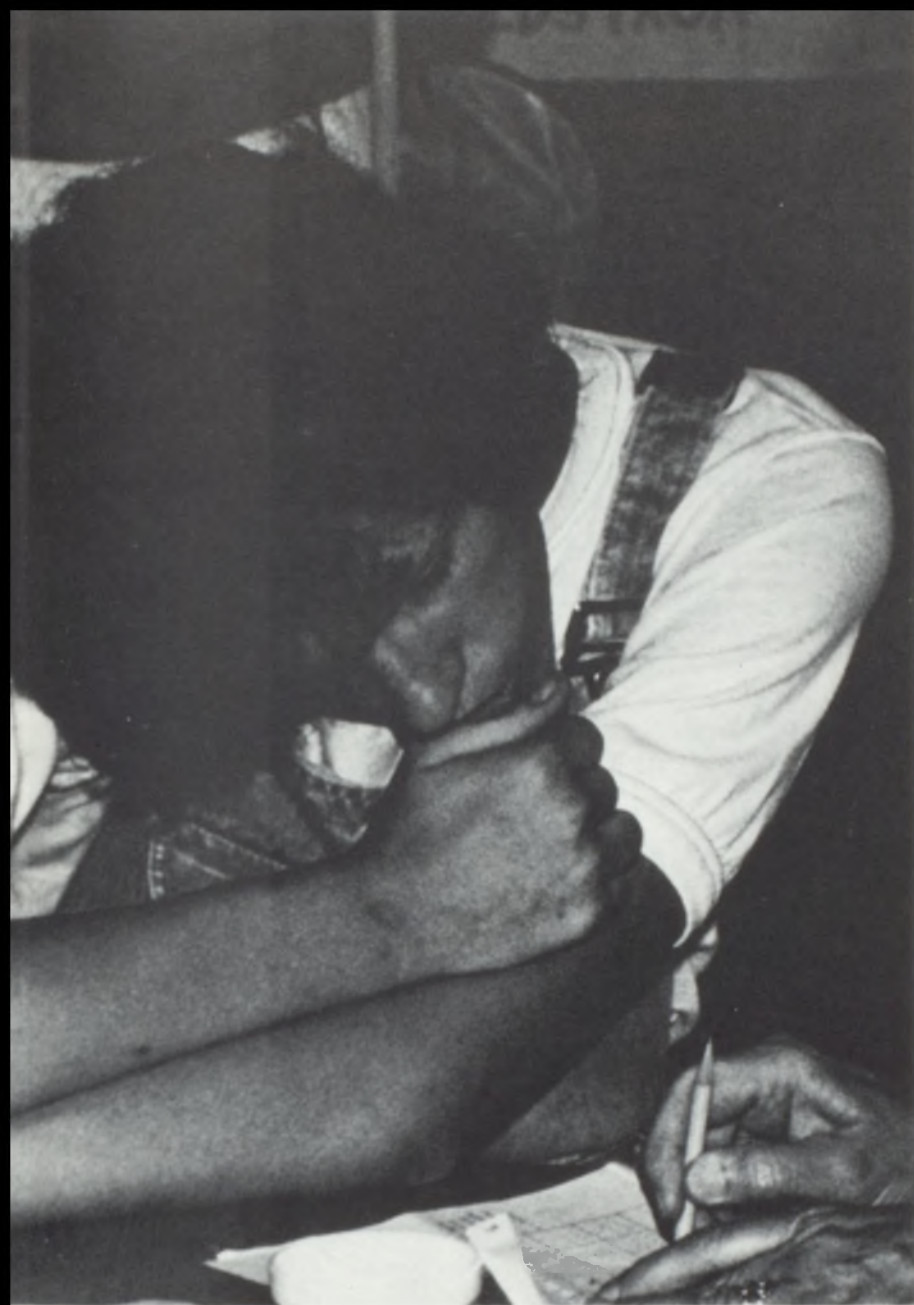

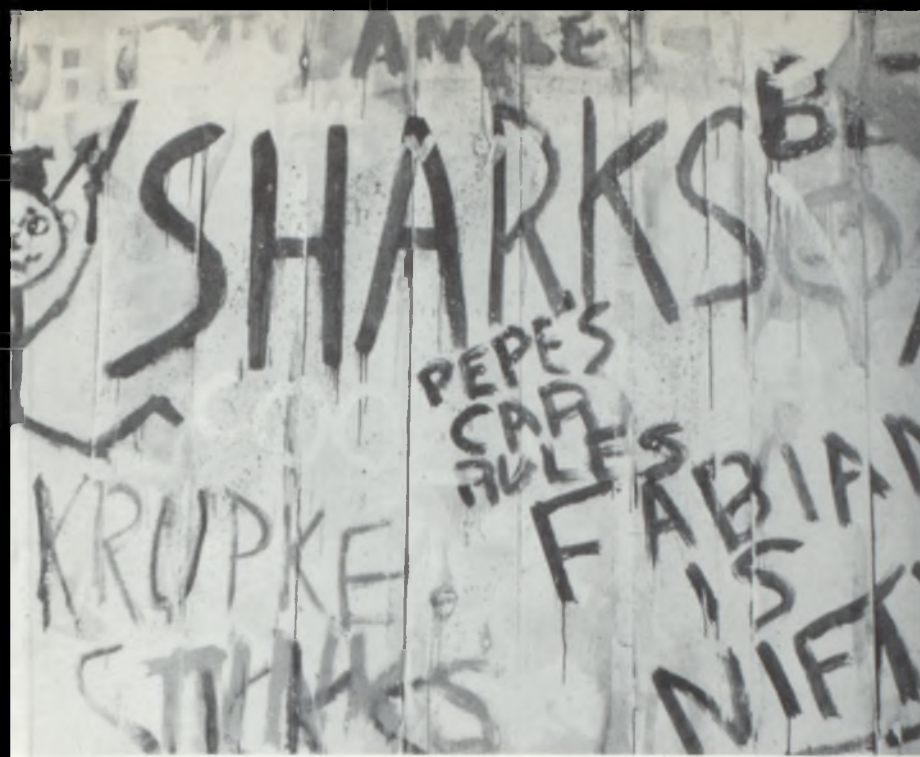
## Musical Difficulties Met

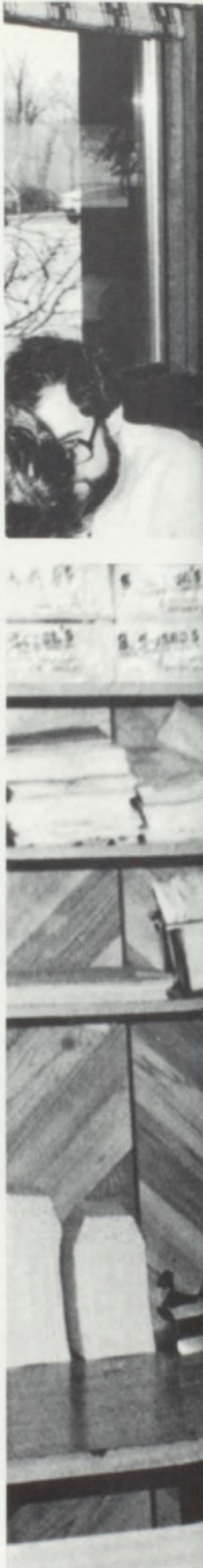

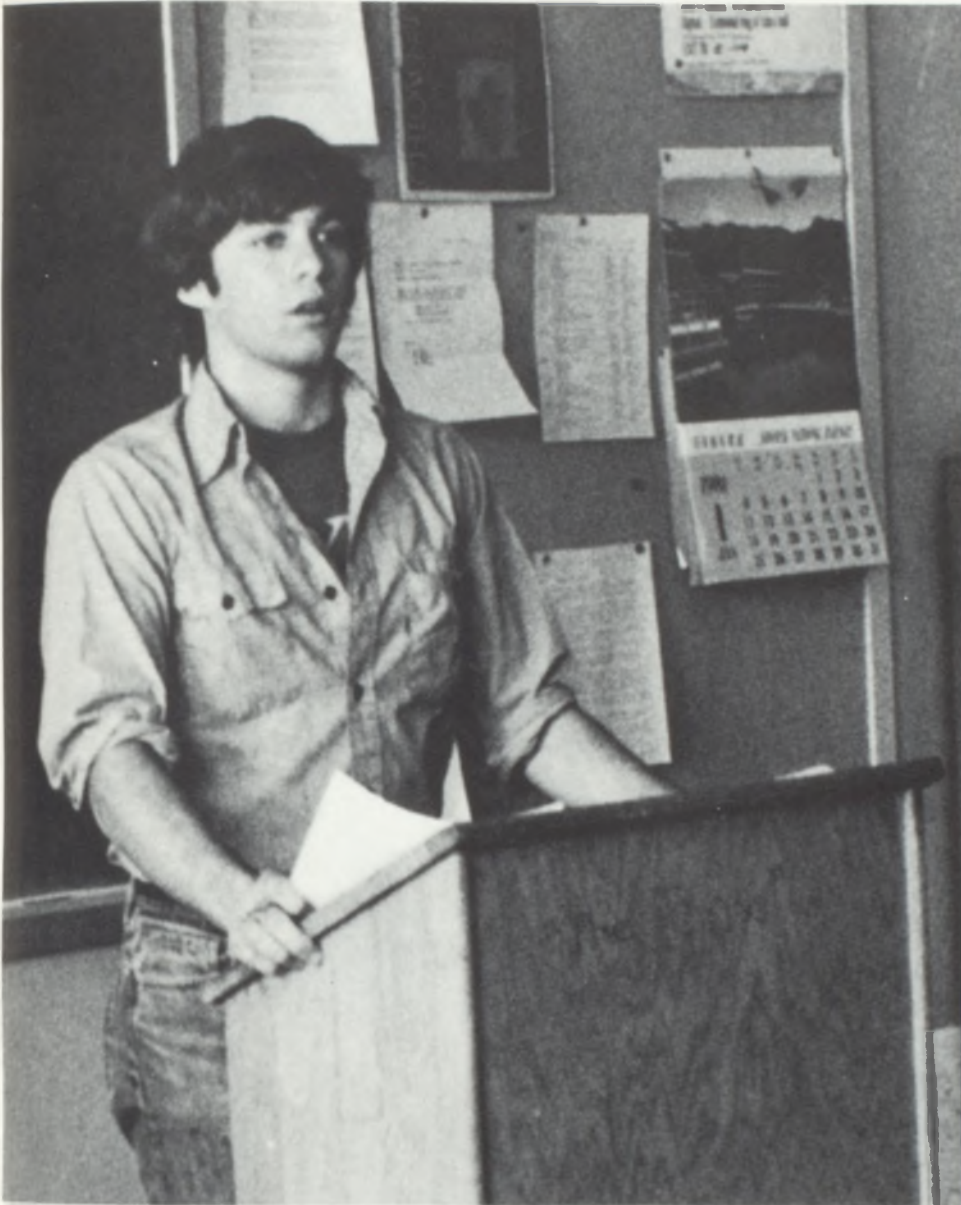

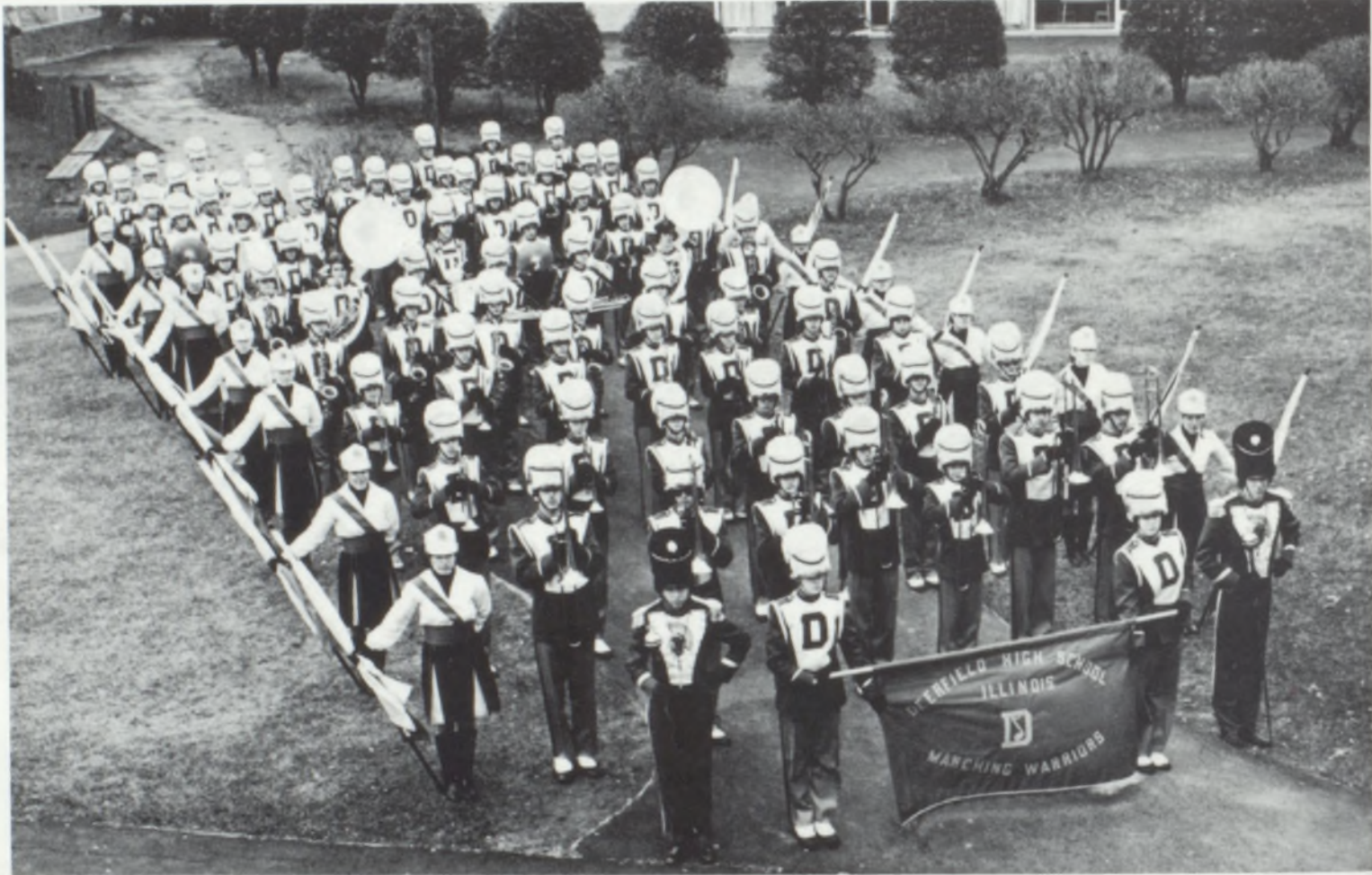

# The New "No Excuse" Word

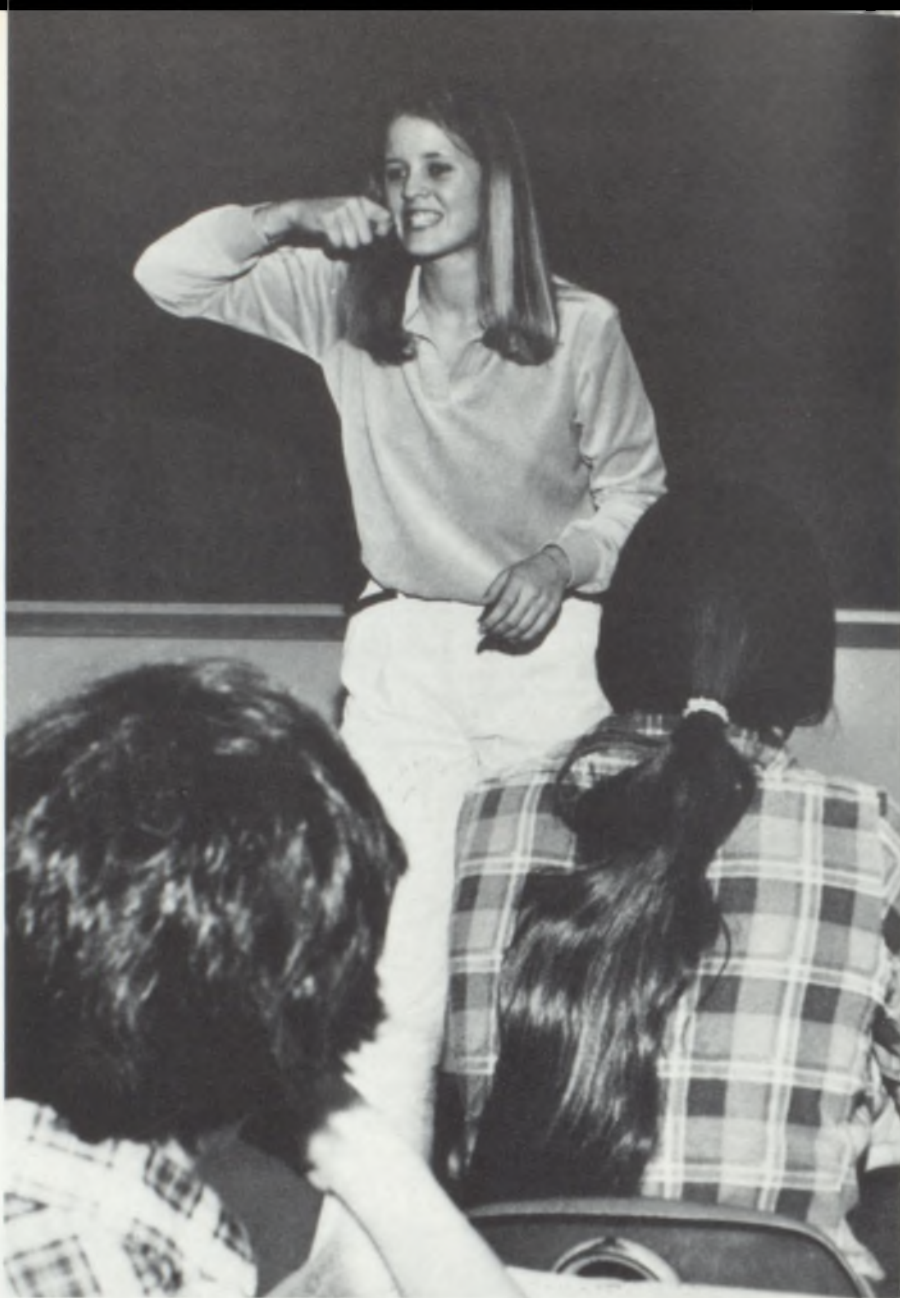

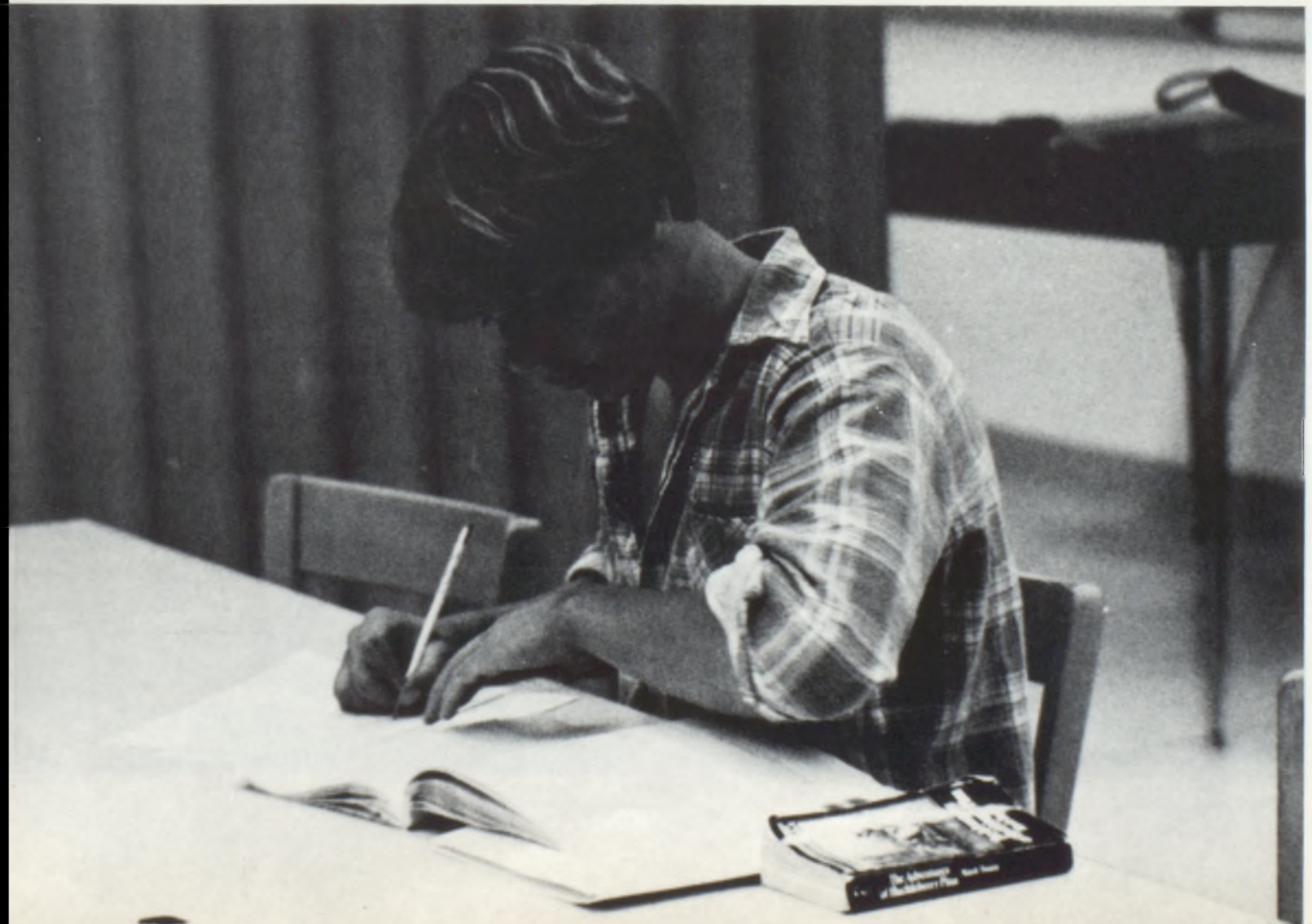

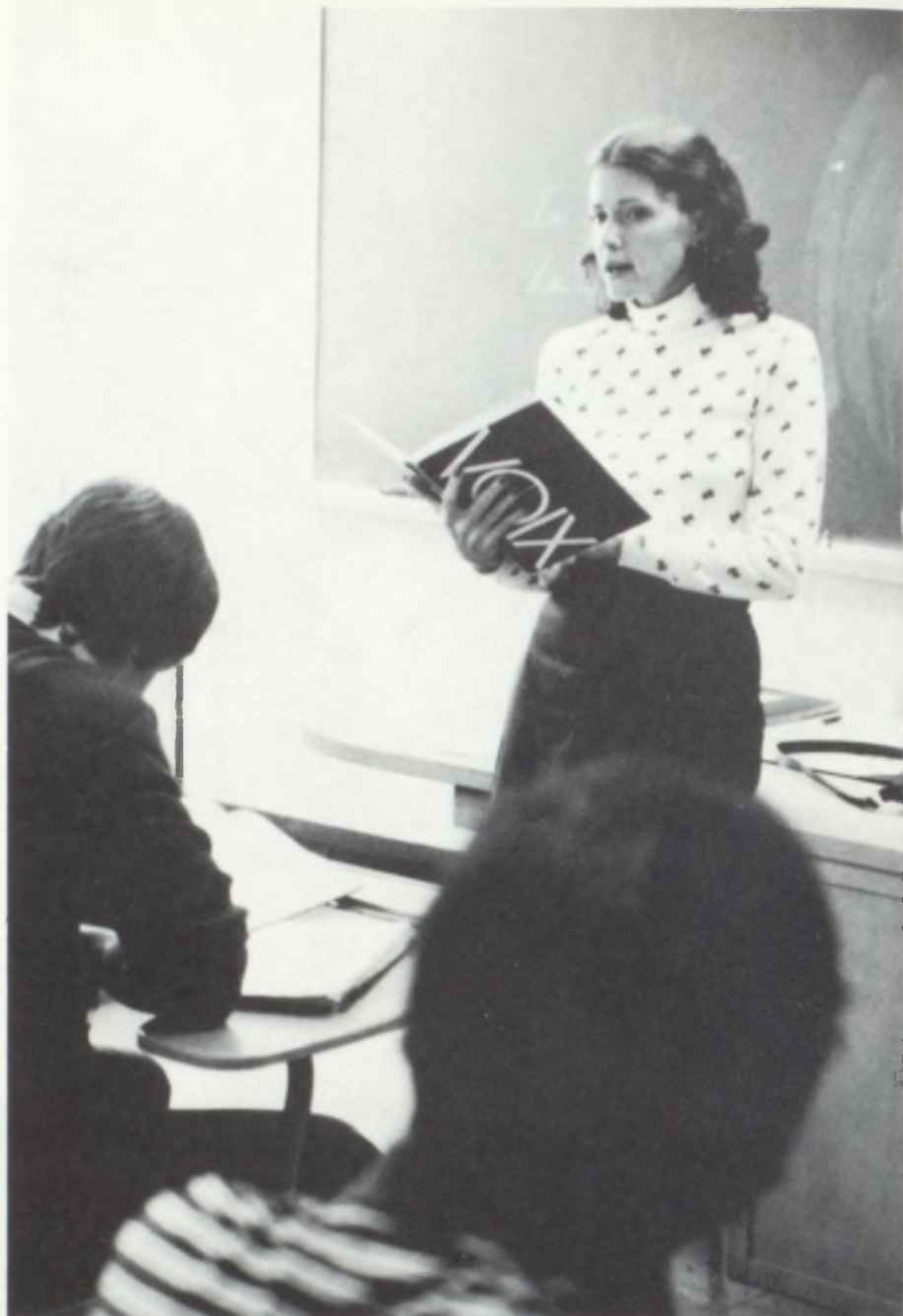

# Bunker Hill, 1942, Garibaldi

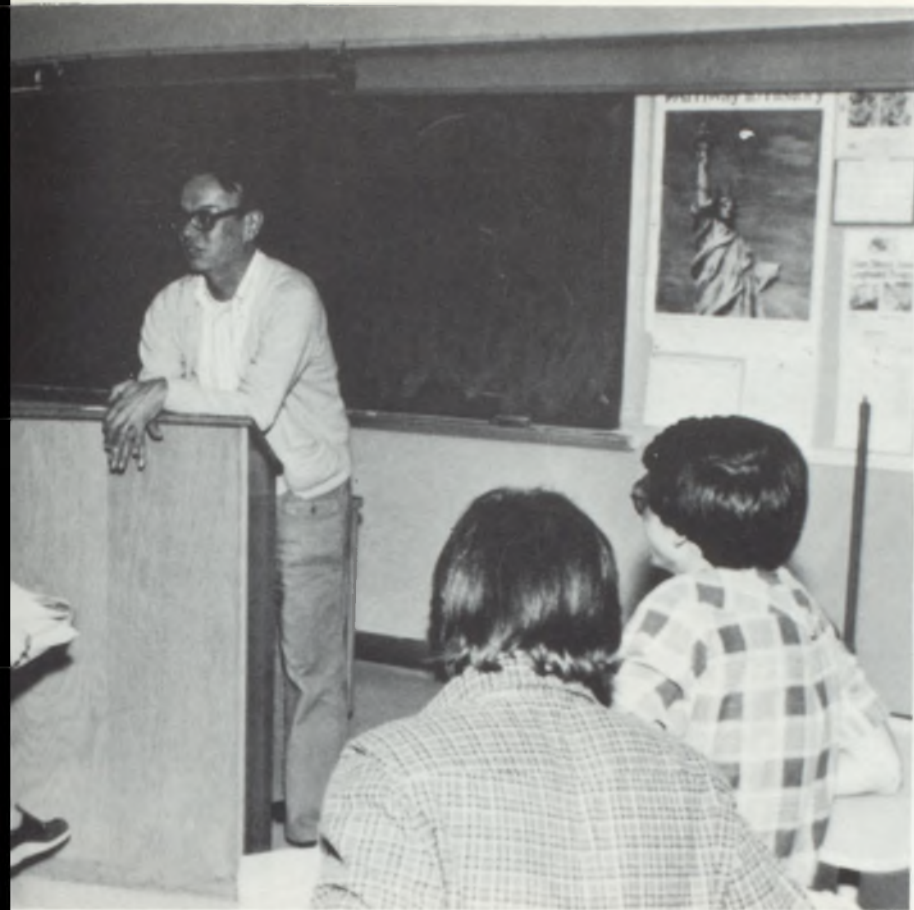

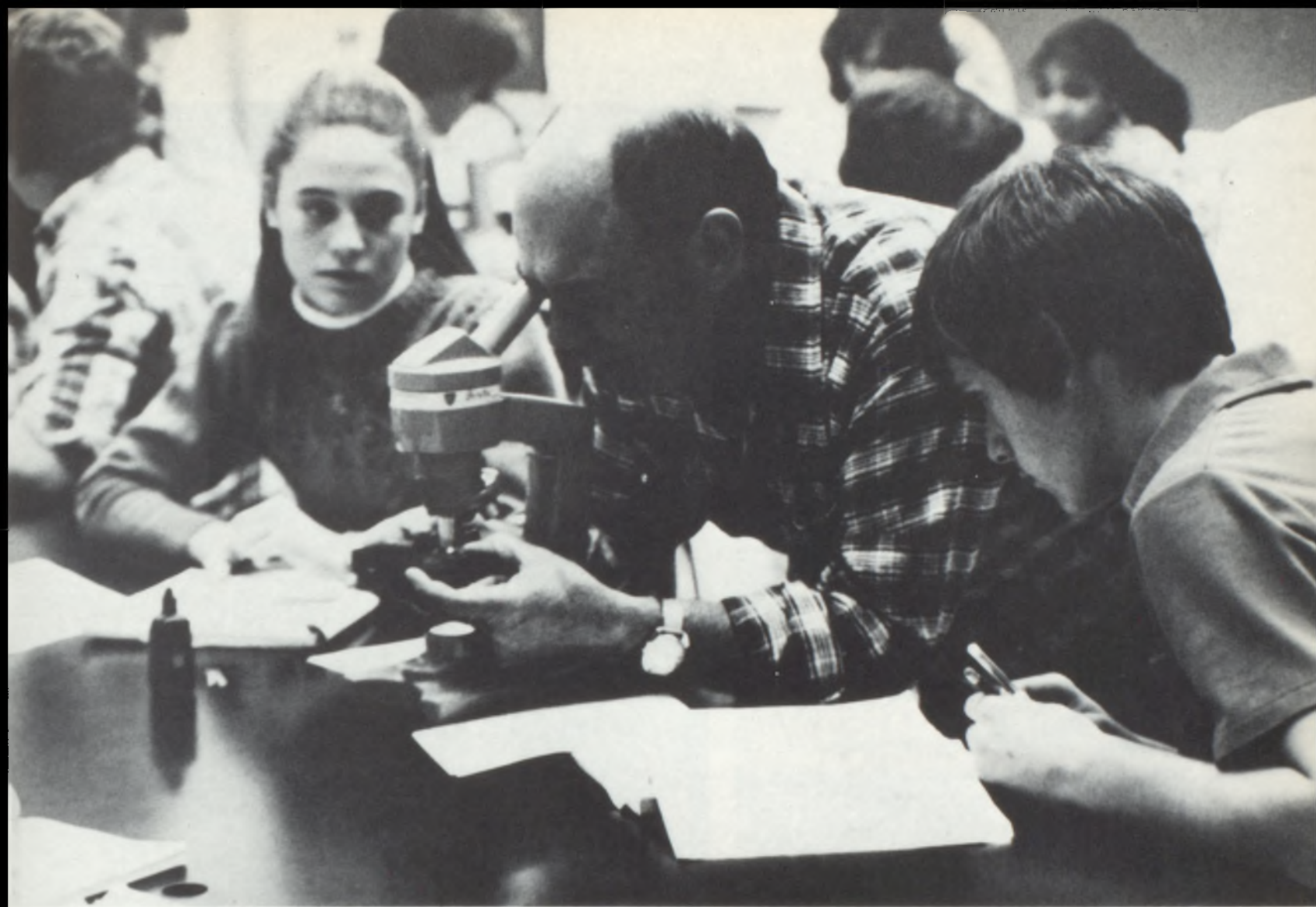

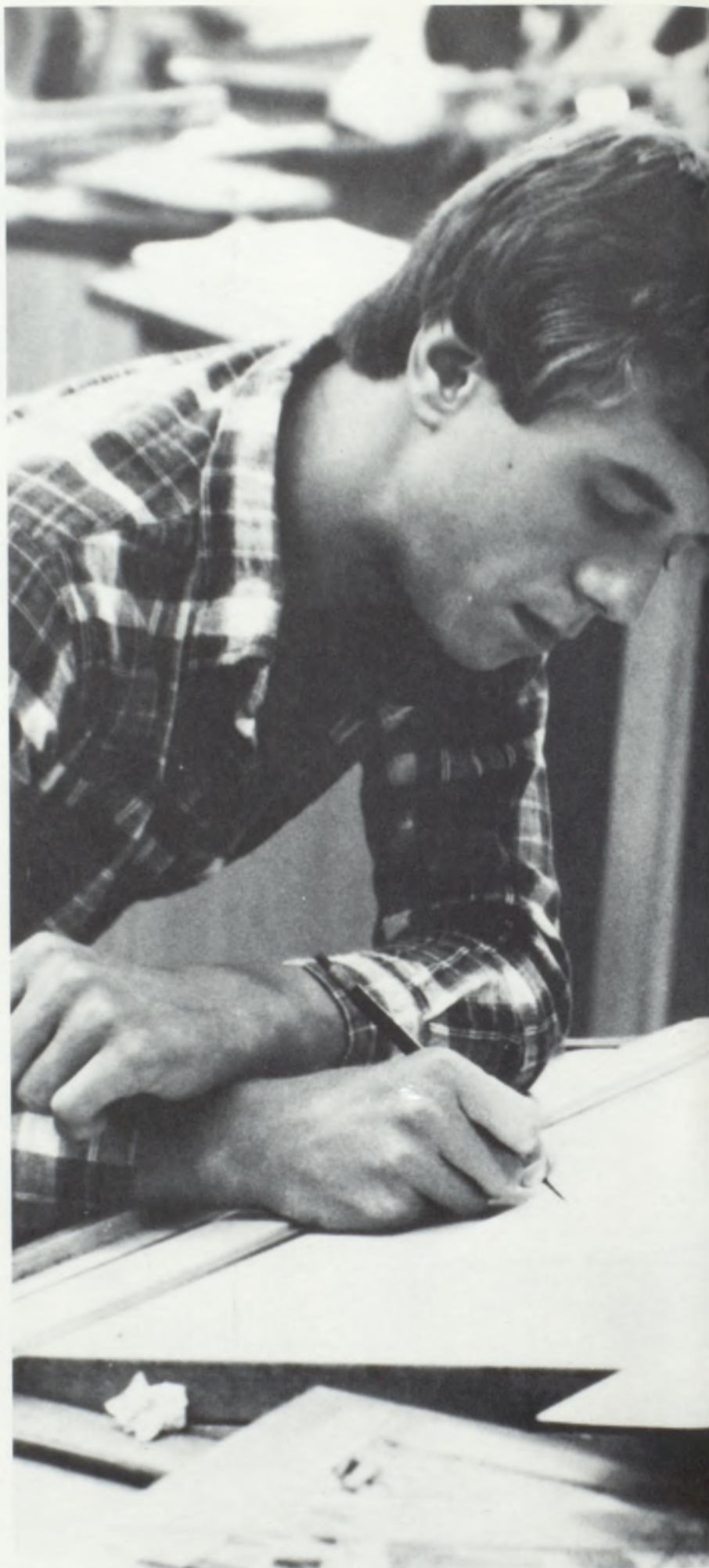
# Mechanics, Merchandising and Magic

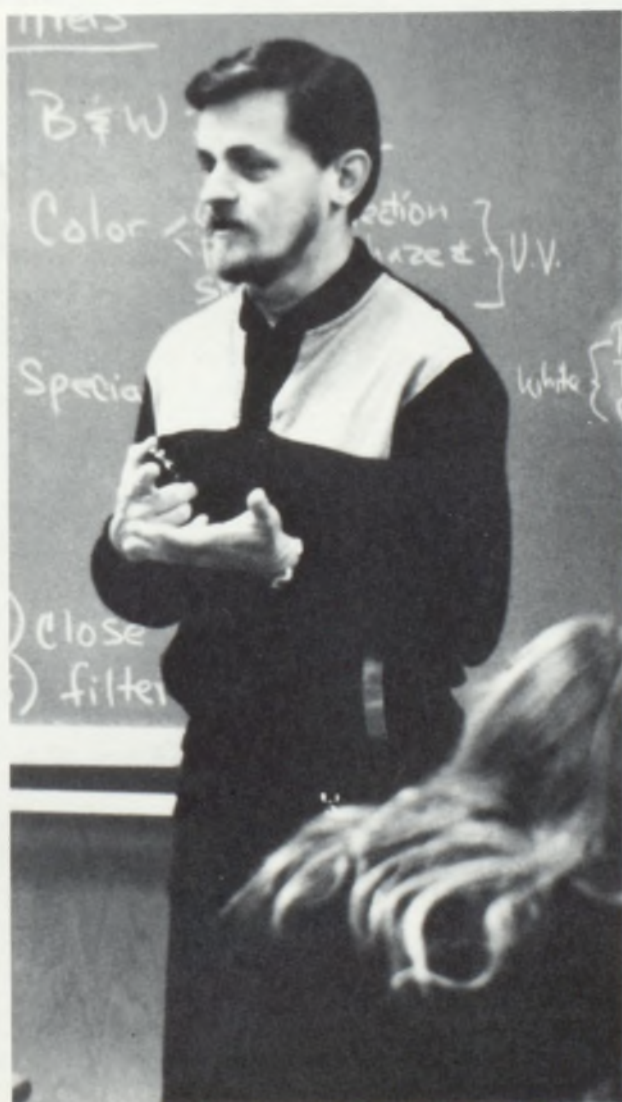

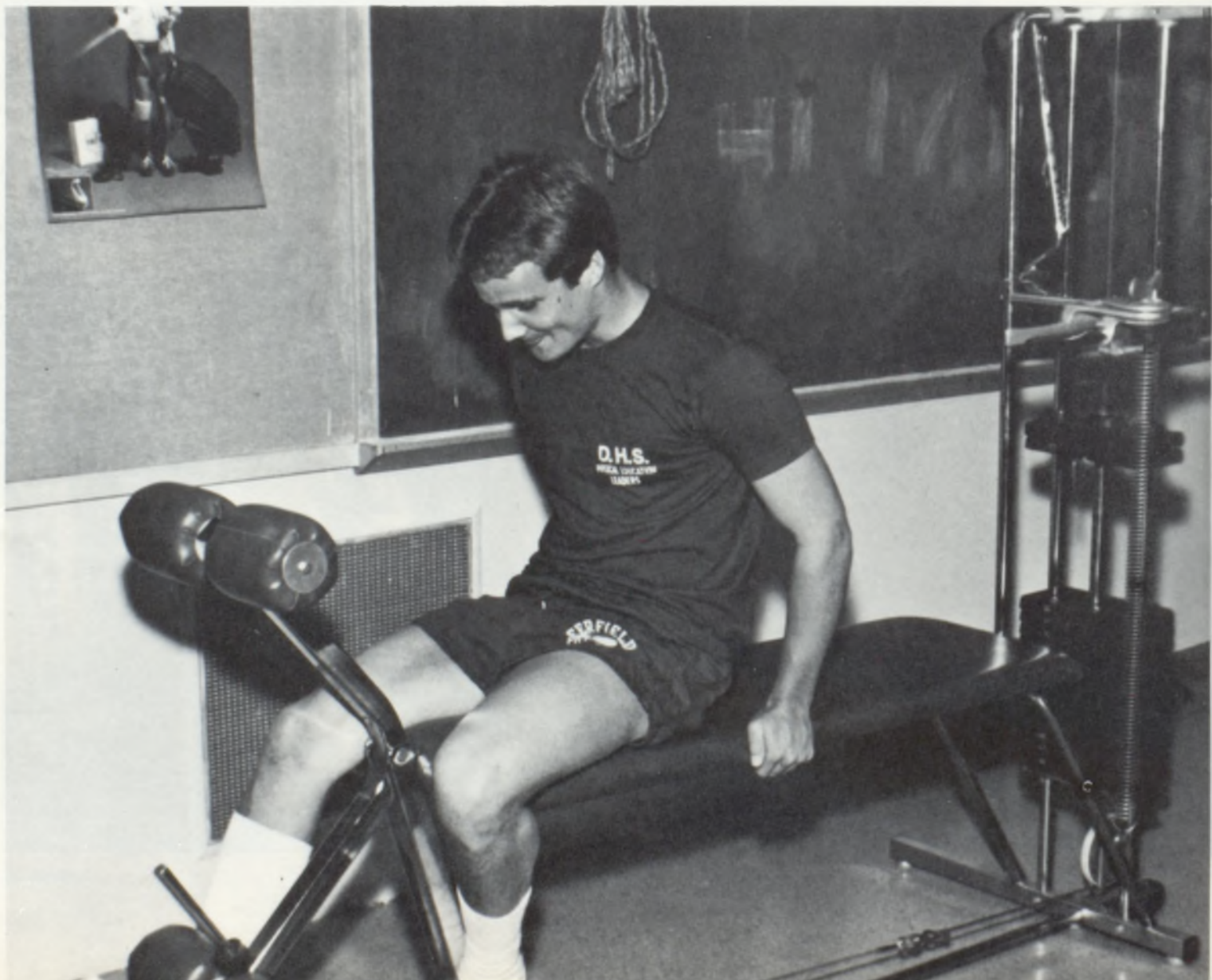

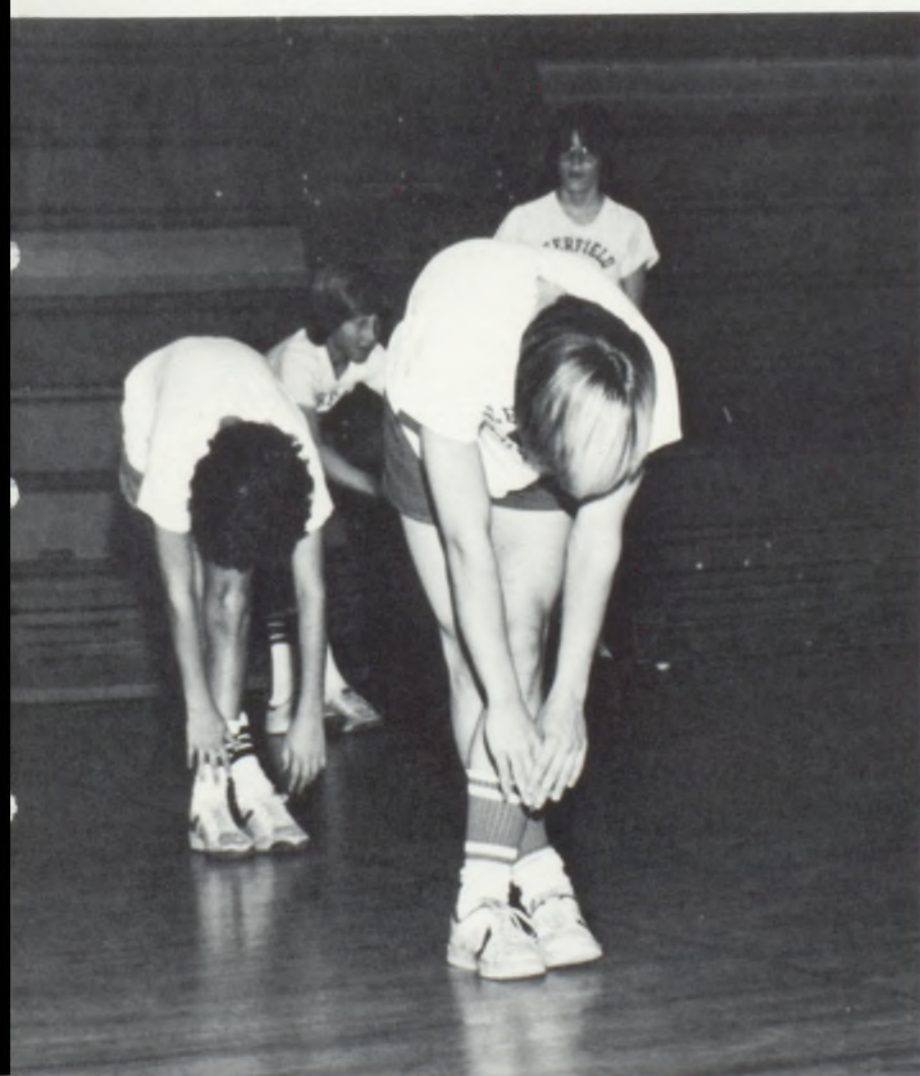

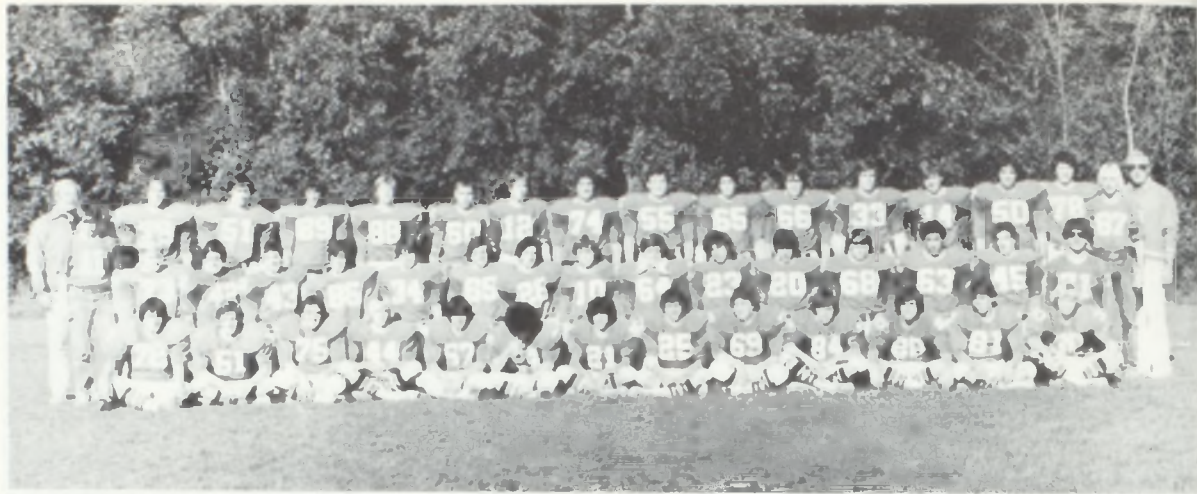
"The 1980 football season was a tough season, as we probably played one of the toughest schedules in the state," Mike Spears stated confidently. This was shown in their steadily improving record.

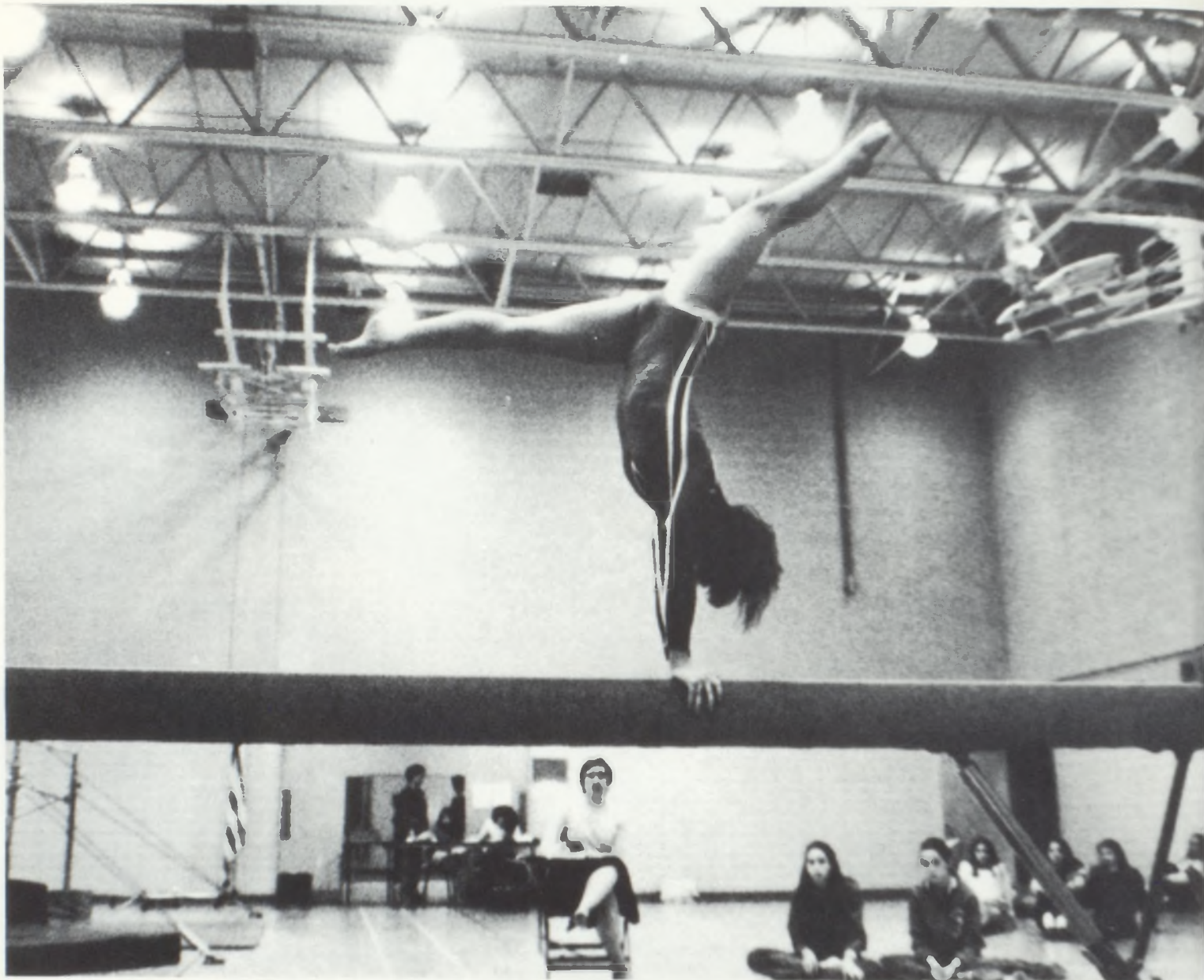

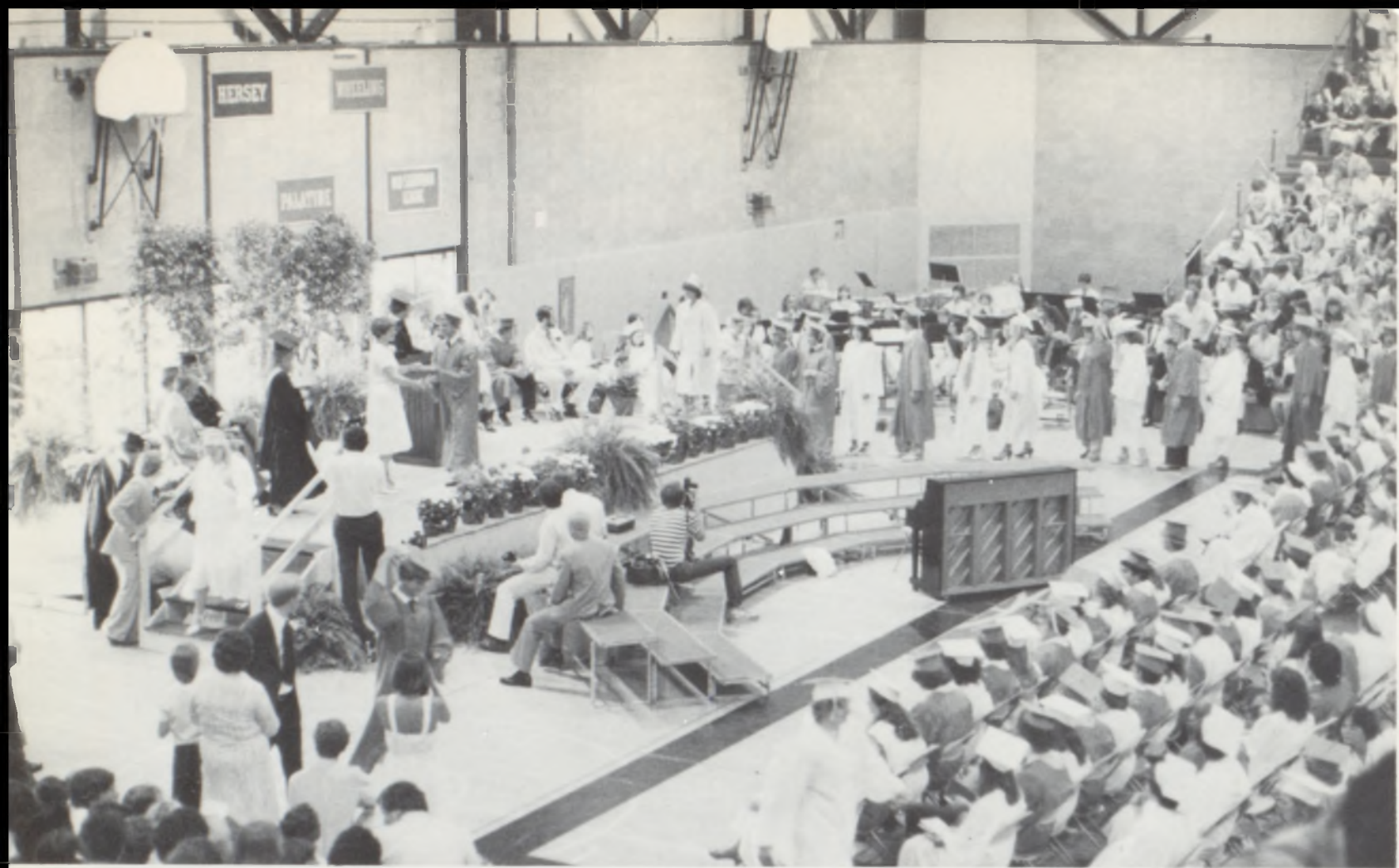


# Best Variety Show ever!
