It has been a long time since DHS has been plagued by such injuries. Dr. Dominic Renga. team physician for the last decade, commented, "There have been more
serious injuries this year than l've ever known at Deerfield." Among these were a sprained neck, a sprained ankle, and six mutilated knees.

The high points of the season were undoubtedly the victory over Sullivan and the first half romping of Evanston. But nobody held his head high when a Waukegan defender intercepted and ran 94 yards to score! Bearing the brunt of injuries and bad luck, the ' 83 Warriors came through learning more than just how to block or tackle.
