



ed to relieve some of my fears about high school."
















One act that appealed immensely to the audience was "(A)typical Blind Date," a three-part series that was continued throughout the show. Starring Andy Kaplan,


Josh Nathan, Denise Crovetti and Michelle Kazak, this number generated many laughs from the crowd.


The nine faculty members who appeared in Stunts were received very well by the audience, especially Mr. Heerman, who showed that he could not only teach history but also deliver a fine performance.

Combining academics and extra-curricular activities, Melba Nicholson sharpens her geometry skills by forming a 90 degree angle with her arms during Stunts practice.













two souvenir picture frames.




Later in the evening, Cristi Barnett and Rocky Pontikes were crowned Turnabout Queen and King and were greeted with thunderous applause.





Throughout the year, students were often amused and entertained at school sponsored activities. Many people learned that they could turn to the school to find interesting diversions from daily life.





chance to do just that!"



Winning places on the All-conference team were Kristi Reirden and Kimie Levy, varsity players who exhibited athletic prowess and leadership ability throughout the season.


The Junior Varsity team had an extremely successful season placing first in its conference. It also set a DHS record by returning home with a second place trophy in the JV tournament.







Concentrating on a victory, the cross Country team prepares for yet another journey along the long path to the finish line against rivals Highland Park and Glenbrook North.





Freshmen Ellen Frauman and Lynn Fodrea and Sophomores Gillian Mor-


ris and Jillian Randell recieved the honors of being named to both the All-conference and All-state teams.




Shooting the Lights Out







HOT OFF THE PRESSES





In an effort to produce an extraordinary yearbook, the editors, occasionally aided by a staff member or two, could be found in the Publications office until the ungodly hour of 11:00 P.M. Constantly faced with seemingly unmeetable deadlines, these devoted individuals busily wrote and edited copy, made layouts, cropped pictures and generally lived by the motto, "I am yearbook, yearbook is me, we are one."

With the techniques that they learned at yearbook camp, Editor in-Chief Carol Schneiderman and Layout Editor Laurie Bendoff were able to implement new ideas into the yearbook, including three spreads of color pages. Thanks to the 1990-91 main editors, the yearbook is excellent in all aspects.

Accepting a greater number of part-time reporters, Deerprints had a more complete combination of ideas and points of view. Another change that took place was the transfer of computer programs to *Microsoft Word*. This new system allowed the editors to organize and form the newspaper more efficiently. Deerprints continued to encourage letters to the editor, which maintained its reputation as a paper of the students, by the students, and for the students.

Weekly meetings found Troubadour members gathered together to choose the prose and poetry to be included in this year's literary magazine. The selection process began with each work being read aloud. The members of Troubadour then analyzed it, and individually rated it. This year's magazine was filled with originality, thanks to the students who created it through submissions or organization. Students put the time in to go to the meetings every week because of the enjoyment of literary and artistic works.





A GATHERING OF PEERS

Implemented just this year, Peer Helping was a new program that provided an outlet through which students could talk confidentially about their personal problems and concerns with others their own age. The Peer Helpers were available in the drop-in center in I109, and students stopped by during their lunch periods on their own or through faculty referrals. Each student helper was trained at a summer weekend retreat and throughout the school year at workshops that dealt with various teenage concerns. Additionally, smaller groups met on a weekly basis with one faculty advisor. At these meetings, the helpers discussed their own feelings in order to better understand and empathize with others. Jon Kaden summarized the new program, commenting, "Peer Helpers started the year with high hopes, and our optimism and unity helped build the foundation for a successful program.

Designed to provide transfer students with a friend to show them around school, Peer Guides helped newcomers find their classes and meet other people until they had adjusted to their new situation. Transfer students were paired up with DHS students according to similar interests and age, which gave transfer students the opportunity to be with someone with whom they would most likely be in a class or extracurricular activity.

Students Together for Education and Prevention raised several hundred dollars for their cause this year from monthly bake sales, a prom ticket raffle and the second annual STEP barbeque held in the courtyard. They also helped to decorate the school for Red Ribbon Week, which promoted drug awareness and sponsored several drugfree activities. The polaroid party was a huge success, as was their dinner for the members at Fuddrucker's. This was a monumental year for STEP because they finally were able to speak at both Wilmot and Shepard junior highs as well as several other parent and student groups.











Model United Nations consisted of a group of students interested in politics and current events. This group was assigned two different countries to represent and spent its time gathering vital information about "hot" topics.







PRIME PRODUCTION

The establishment of the Theatre Steering Committee created an opportunity for students to get involved with the planning of DHS theatre. 


A PINCH OF "SAGE"














SPIRIT ON THE SIDELINES



DHS's usual success was brought about not only through individual effort, but through the giving nature of students and faculty. The result was a creative classroom environment that could only breed success.





One new aspect of the P.E. department this year was the addition of lacrosse to the junior and senior boys' curriculum. 
Caught in the Middle

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
COLOPHON





