## A GATHERING OF PEERS

Implemented just this year, Peer Helping was a new program that provided an outlet through which students could talk confidentially about their personal problems and concerns with others their own age. The Peer fielpers were available in the drop-in center in I109, and students stopped by during their lunch periods on their own or through faculty referrals. Dach student helper was trained at a summer weekend retreat and throughout the school year at workshops that dealt with various teenage concerns. Additionally, smaller groups met on a weekly basis with one faculty advisor. At these meetings, the helpers discussed their own feelings in order to better understand and empathize with others. Jon Kaden summarized the new program, commenting, "Peer Helpers started the year with high hopes, and our optimism and unity helped build the foundation for a successful program.

Designed to provide transfer students with a friend to show them around school, Peer Guides helped newcomers find their classes and meet other people until they had adjusted to their new situation. Transfer students were paired up with DHS students according to similar interests and age, which gave transfer students the opportunity to be with someone with whom they would most likely be in a class or extracurricular activity.

Students Together for Dducation and Prevention raised several hundred dollars for their cause this year from monthly bake sales, a prom ticket rafile and the second annual STPP barbeque held in the courtyard. They also helped to decorate the school for Red Ribbon Week, which promoted drug awareness and sponsored several drugfree activities. The polaroid party was a huge success, as was their dinner for the members at Fuddrucker's. This was a monumental year for STPP because they finally were able to speak at both Wilmot and Shepard junior highs as well as several other parent and student groups.

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## PRIME PRODUCTION

The establishment of theTheatre Steering Commitee created an opportunity for students to get involved with the planning of DHS theatre. Students met monthly to discuss ideas and suggestions for curricular and co-curricular theatre programs. They helped organize classes and choose the 1992 play selection. The board enjoyed having an input on activities in which they would later take part.

Theatrix, the student theatre organition, met weekly to further students' interest in the theatrical arts. ## Math on the Menu

As we accelerate towards the turn of the century, the need for technological literacy has become increasingly more necessary to compete in a rapidly changing workplace. The DHS Math Department has also developed well with this modern trend. Two new innovations that kept the department on the leading edge of technology were introduced to the faculty and $95 \%$ of the DHS students this year.

One was the Geometric Supposer, a Macintosh program that underwent a year-long analysis by the Math faculty. Its applications related to the changes of variables in geometric figures and their effects upon the shape's characteristics.

The rectangular blue boxes found in the hands of several Mathematics students were
the new "TI-81"'s, graphing calculators which were expected to enhance the learning experience of students in both introductory and higher level Mathematics courses.

Although skeptics may have believed that the new calculators deprived students of learning important concepts and techniques as well as they should, Mr. Klein, Chairman of the Math Department, remained confident that the faculty would properly instruct students so that they would "...learn how to use it as a tool rather than as a crutch.'

The present math teachers could not have done a better job. Mr. Klein remarked contently, "I feel fortunate to be associated with a professional and competent staff which is genuinely interested in the learning of its students."

DHS continued providing excellent assistance through the resource and guidance sections, implementing many new features in the extremely effective system.

The IMC underwent a number of changes, from putting out computer programs to adding new staff members. The IMC also expanded to include DHS's first television station. WHDS staff member Sari Topel commented, "The IMC staff was always helpful in assisting with our video productions."

The Learning Resource Center was a very important part of the Special Education Department. The LRC allowed special-needs students to obtain any help that they might need in order to perform to the best of their ability.
