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




The library also joined in on using computers for their benefits. Computers are used in the process of checking out books. They are also used to keep track of overdue books.


Whether they are used for publications, in the library or in the classrooms, computers are used around school for the benefit of the students. The use of computers improves the education of the students.








Placing a tape in a VCR, Mr. Durey shows off the new Fiber Optics equipment.










No longer will teachers have to wheel televisions from room to room because the Fiber Optics System allows for a television in every room. Junior Chris Hoefke was glad to know his job was over.

The Homecoming festivities continued Saturday morning with a parade through Deerfield. The floats were decorated by each class according to their class theme.



Even though the students of DHS were "Lost In Space," they easily found ways to make Homecoming 1992 a great success.


In his final year as head coach of the Deerfield Varsity Football Team, Coach Paul Adams speaks to the student body and rallies the school onto victory.

Senior Cheerleaders and Pom Pons take time out at the pep rally to perform in a special routine. The Senior women continued the tradition of entertaining the crowd.















One of the highlights of the pep rally is the announcement of the Homecoming Court. Seniors Janet Malek and Ryan Lombardo were crowned Queen and King.

Each year the gym is divided into four sections. The Senior section was packed with rowdy Seniors dressed in their class color, black, and led the rally in spirit and cheering.




Throughout the pep rally the Cheerleaders' performances entertain the student body. The students responded with great enthusiasm.





Other students, although they do their homework each night, find that they have too much homework to finish in one night and therefore must finish the work they did not get to the night before in school the next day.




It did not take long for these Freshmen to realize that it is more fun to do homework with friends at school rather than at home alone.





Rebecca was struck with a rare disease late in August of 1992 which left her paralyzed from the neck down. Her mounting medical bills were astronomical and her family had no insurance to cover the rehabilitation costs. In order to try to ease the burden placed on the Wylie Family, the annual fundraiser, School Chest, went into effect.

The goal of the student body was to raise \$18,000, which turned out to be around fifteen dollars per person.


In order to reach the goal, homerooms organized bake sales, raffles, bowl and walkathons and many more activities to help raise the fifteen dollars per student objective. The teachers also got into the act when Physics Man, Mr. Theissen, allowed someone to break two cinder blocks over his chest. Those homerooms that raised the most money won prizes such as donut breakfasts and a field trip of their choice.

During the three weeks of School Chest, the school pulled together as a whole and worked for a common goal. At first \$18,000 seemed like an extremely high goal, but we actually exceeded the goal and raised almost \$24,000. "I think it's a great tribute to our school. Everyone has been extremely generous," said Junior Laura Duprey.

Life After Academics









devastation caused by two major hurricanes. We were also able to witness the starvation in Somalia and the Civil War in Yugoslavia.





The key element to success this year was the depth of players who specialized in certain areas. The team hopes to carry over their goals that they were unable to accomplish this year to next year.









The Boys' Golf team also had a successful season. The team possessed much team unity.


Hopes were high for this senior filled squad as the golf season commenced. The Warriors started strong winning their first meet 197-190 against Maine East.



Training Brings Success In Conference and State


Members travel to France for training







Throughout the year, Captains Seniors Seth Kane, Seth Berk and Jim Perrin, along with Coach Sheri Meyer, stressed team unity.


















Everyone Has a Chance to Help Someone







Unique Interests Fuel DHS Students' Minds


Students experience technology and academics first hand through three different organizations: Computer Club, DASA and Mathletes. These organizations give students an opportunity to expand their academic interests outside of school.



Participating in Athletic Clubs without Breaking a Sweat








oreign Language Opens Up A Whole New "World" To Students

Besides adding cultural awareness to the curriculum, teachers are trying to integrate more conversation in the classroom. There




Mr. Malek would like everyone to know that "if a student is interested in any type of science, there is a class in which he or she will fit in."




She said, "I thought History was going to be a boring class, but Mr. Sprague really makes it interesting."



he Fine Arts Program Offers Many Classes For The Students' Enjoyment









However, we do believe headlines and sub-headlines were printed in Helvetica bold at 24 and 14 pt. types respectively. Body copy was printed in Futura Medium in 12 pt. size. 

"Our daily atmosphere was positive and made school an enjoyable place to be," said Senior Jennifer Levison.




